Talbot Goes Purple is a substance abuse awareness and education program that engages our community and our youth to stand up against substance abuse.

Talbot Goes Purple includes purple clubs in our middle and high schools, through which students learn that they do not need drugs or alcohol to meet life's challenges. The project encourages our youth and community to 'Go Purple' as a sign of taking a stand against substance abuse.

The purpose of the project is to promote the 'new conversation' - one that includes prescription drugs.

Talbot Goes Purple is an initiative from Talbot County Sheriff's Office and Tidewater Rotary, in partnership with Talbot County Public Schools and Mid-Shore Community Foundation.



HOW CAN I HELP?

Talk with your kids.

Lock up your prescription medications.

Properly dispose of unused medications.

Get trained on Naloxone.

Share our educational messages.

Encourage your child to get involved with a TGP club at school.

Don't accept the use of ANY substances, including e-cigs, tobacco, alcohol or marijuana!

GOOD SAMARITAN LAW

Educate your kids on Maryland's Good Samaritan Law, which protects people who call 911 when someone has overdosed on drugs or alcohol. It DOES NOT protect people who leave someone who has overdosed.

GET NARCAN TRAINED!

Narcan (Naloxone) is a lifesaving prescription drug that reverses the effects of an opioid overdose.

Call the Talbot County Health Department Prevention Office for FREE trainings at 410-819-5600.

Maryland now has a standing order for Narcan, which means you no longer need a prescription. Call your pharmacist for details.
